

BUILDING UPDATES Jill Bagwe

Sprinkler Upgrade - As was mentioned in May's newsletter, Facilities and Operations are proceeding with the sprinkler installation project within Chemistry West. Fire code requires that any conjoined buildings must have a fire retardant system in place to prevent the spread of fire between them. With CCIS slated for occupancy as of March 1, 2011; F&O will need to have at least contracted out the installation of sprinklers on all of the north windows on the 3rd to 4th floors (1st and 2nd floors already have fire shutters in place that were installed last year). I have not received a timeline as to when they will embark upon this project, but I will apprise those impacted by this work of the dates when I receive that information.

Building Envelope Project - The anticipated delivery date of the windows is expected to be January 12, 2011 and installation will begin immediately thereafter and should go until the end of February. **Delnor** has been contracted to perform the work and they anticipate that it will take one day per lab. However, for the "*clearance to work in hazardous areas*" form, Delnor will request two days per lab to account for unforeseen conditions. Please note that only the windows on the west side of Chemistry West (*those that look out onto Quad*) will be replaced. If you would like a preview of the finished product, Delnor has already installed a sample window in Room W1-11.

The process is for their trades to enter each lab and office on the west side of Chemistry West and install an insular panel into each window opening. They will then access the windows from the outside, remove and replace the windows from that position and once done, come back into the labs to remove the insular panels. The window crews will deal with the blinds, but ask that our lab and office occupants clear out the area around the windows to allow easy access to the windows and enabling them to do their work efficiently and minimize the time they are in your room.

Please note that because of the construction methodology, the site supervisor, **Dave Dagenais**, will be able to juggle which one they work on therefore we should be able to accommodate some adjustments to when particular labs are completed. If there are some limitations that would make it difficult for you to meet their proposed target date to do your room, please contact me to arrange for an alternate date by not later than **Wednesday, December 22, 2010.**

Chemistry West Renewal Project – There is a belief that with the recent announcement by Stephen Harper of the extension of the KIP stimulus funds, that the renovations on on CW5N can now be delayed; that is not the case. Under the threat of financial penalties to Delnor, there is still pressure for them to complete a majority of the work by March 31st. As such, they need to press with their work schedule to avoid those penalties. As a result, the department will still have further requests for access in labs and offices on both the 3rd and 4th floors, and as well, it will result in a loss of fumehoods to some research groups who are on the same risers that service the 5th floors. We will endeavor to individually consult with impacted research groups and give them as much lead time as possible

We are in the final iteration of the CW4N designs with a focus on theoretical and instrumentation chemistry labs, a classroom for use by the Registrar's (to replace W4-46), faculty offices and graduate student write-up space. Once the 4th floor occupants move over to CCIS by the third week of March, Delnor will hoard off this floor and start demolition. Consideration has been requested that a passage way, allowing access to the CCIS pedway via the 3rd floor, be built. The expected completion date for the work on the 4th floor is mid-August.

Dr. Vederas has tried on many hats on the way to his current position as University Professor and Canada Research Chair. When he first started university, he majored in sculpture. But he soon discovered he had no talent for the craft and promptly transferred to chemistry. THat's because research is where his passion really lies, and he likens it to a hobby. "Research is like fishing. Nothing happens until you get a strike or enough time. But when you do, you get this rush of adrenaline – and that's the fun part of it. It takes skill and tenacity and time. Lots and lots of time."

And it takes curiosity, which has been a big part of Vederas' success throughout his 40-year career. He has authored 250 research publications, 4 books and 13 patents. And he recently received his 24th Award of excellence! That's more than 1 award every 2 years!

Last month, Dr. Vederas won the 2010 Zolo Astech Award for Outstanding Leadership in Alberta Science. Over the span of his career, Dr. Vederas' awards have included:

- The Merck, Sharp and Dohm Award (1986) by the Chemical Institute of Canada
- The John Labatt Award by the Chemical Institute of Canada (1991)
- The Rutherford Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching (UofA) (1995)
- The Gordon Kaplan award for Excellence in Research (UofA) (2003)
- The Alfred Bader Award from the Canadian Society for Chemistry (2005)
- Alberta Centennial Medal Province of Alberta medal to Alberta university leaders (2006)
- Fellow of the Royal Society Canada (1997); United Kingdom (2006); London (2009)

A number of the awards Dr. Vederas has received are presented to only one individual per year, so receiving them is a great honour.

Where Dr. Vederas has the most fun is in interacting with researchers in the lab. That, "and in learning new things," he says. "Here at the UofA, it's special: we have excellent facilities, opportunities for research and a nice environment." These things have been key to keeping him here for the 33 years he has made Edmonton home. And it's not only students and colleagues who are fortunate to have the esteemed researcher here. As an internationally recognized leader in medicinal and bioorganic chemistry, Vederas has improved countless lives, both in Canada and around the world.

Dr. Vederas: Congratulations on your outstanding achievements. We are grateful for your hard work and dedication. Here's to your next award (or many!) by 2012!


